NDAS 50th Anniversary:

You should all be aware by now that this year we are celebrating 50 years of the North Devon Archaeological Society. You will have received your copy of 'Bronze Age to Bottle Seals', our celebratory publication, and hopefully will have found it an absorbing and enjoyable read. Our thanks must go to Alison Mills of the Museum of North Devon for taking on the responsibility of publication and making it possible to commission Aiken Graphics to do the lay-out work. Bruce Aiken was as helpful as he has always been (with the newsletter); his distinctive style has become the NDAS house style and his meticulous care and advice are greatly appreciated. Printing was paid for by the Society out of our reserve, and it is intended that money spent on production should be recouped through sales of the book to the general public. Copies are available for sale at – among others - the Museum in Barnstaple and there is an order form on the NDAS website (www.ndas.org.uk) – why not give one as a gift for Christmas? It would be good to think that in the not too distant future we can publish a follow-up volume – or volumes - highlighting current research in North Devon. The West Yeo Project:

This new NDAS project is now well under way under the guidance of Derry Bryant and Bob Shrigley. West Yeo Farm, near Witheridge has developed out of a Domesday manor and is located within an area of apparently quite intense Bronze Age activity. The post-medieval farmhouse burnt down in the 19th century, and when a new house was built, the farm was recast on 'model farm' lines. The result is that the farm includes high guality 19th century buildings which need to be recorded. The remaining buildings of the old farm were demolished in the 1950s, but their foundations remain beneath the turf and represent an opportunity to explore the origins of a medieval settlement. The farm owner, Kate Palmer is very keen to see a full landscape project unfold on her land, and there promises to be a considerable period of NDAS involvement here with many opportunities to gain experience and training. So far there have been two major spells of activity. The first was taken up with several days of geophysical survey which not only began to reveal buried features, but provided an opportunity for NDAS members to learn some of the skills and techniques of geophysical survey. The second extended visit comprised 5 days of fieldwalking as a result of which it became apparent from the flints recovered that prehistoric activity. already apparent from numerous finds on neighbouring land, extended across the land of West Yeo. Most of the material is debitage, suggesting a working area rather than chance losses. The flints are to be examined by Ann Plummer. This promises to be an absorbing and rewarding project in an area of Devon which has seen little archaeological exploration. Stop Press:The Council for British Archaeology (CBA) has granted NDAS £500 to help finance the West Yeo project; this will mainly be used to purchase a laptop computer in order to process the downloads from the earth resistance meter.

Taddiport:

A site at Taddiport (Great Torrington) was mentioned to you in the May news sheet. Just to remind you, Nick Duncan who lives at Taddiport has been clearing the site of a cottage which either fell down or was burnt down in the early 20th century, and has found truly enormous quantities of pottery ranging from medieval North Devon gravel tempered ware to late 19th century white china and including some high quality imported late medieval Portuguese material. The site is situated next to the reputed site of the Leper Hospital. The site is worthy of a professional investigation, but failing that, we can help out by at least assisting Nick with his pottery. During August four NDAS members went to Taddiport to help with cleaning and identification of the pottery. Doing this sort of thing is a very good way to become familiar with pottery styles and types. Nick was very appreciative of our help and will welcome volunteers any time. Expect further calls for assistance to go out !

Hulks in the Estuary:

Chris Preece, the Society's marine archaeologist, has had a meeting with a representative of English Heritage to discuss recording the rapidly decaying hulks of vessels abandoned at various times in the Taw and Torridge estuary. EH is willing to put money into this and the suggestion is that a professional body should tackle the task with volunteer assistance such as can be provided by NDAS. Hillsborough:


There is the possibility that a group will be formed to survey the promontory fort or cliff castle on Hillsborough, Ilfracombe. Hillsborough is a prominent feature of the North Devon coast, but very little is known about it, in fact it is not really understood at all.
